Newsletter Mutanyana Weru, Summer 2014.

Here is our latest newsletter with information about our project in Mozambique.

1. Situation spring 2014

Earlier this year we received information about unsafety in Mozambique. Through the newsletter of Father André's congregation we learned that the situation in Maputo is very tense. Robbery and kidnapping are very actual, especially the local rich people and foreigners are victims. Father Huub, a colleague of Father André, was a victim of black mail and had to hide himself in the country in an attempt to stay away from the criminals.

Very recently Father André himself was victim of a robbery and he reported the following:

"Two weeks ago it was my turn. The car was in the garage so I took the bus to the bank and was accompanied by 2 security men. Then from the bank on foot to the hospital to buy diapers. Because the correct seize was not available there, we crossed the street to a supermarket. About 15 meters away from the front door suddenly there stood three armed men in front of us: without saying a word one of them grabbed my money bag, they jumped in a car and disappeared. Obviously one of them had followed us from the bank and informed his fellow robbers in the car. So, what do you do when someone is pointing his loaded gun at your head? An unwanted reaction could lead to fatal results. Later on you will think: how stupid, I should have done such or such or not done such or such. Happily, in the bank I put €750 in my pocket together with my passport and permit to stay. This robbery put me in a financial unwanted situation: we are now using the last financial reserves from the bank and no one is willing or able to help. I therefore ask our Dutch Foundation to transfer as soon as possible the amount of €2000 (about the amount of stolen money) to help us out for a couple of weeks." Needless to say that our Foundation reacted in a positive way to this emergency call and transferred the money.

2. Agricultural project

This project for single women and their children continues gradually. The financial results of the sale of products are small, but the agricultural project is a success because it serves as a source of food for the families. It looks that the private use of the produced food is becoming the main goal.

3. Hospital visit

Below please find an impression of the Hospital visit of Mrs. Thea de Wit, living in the Dutch town named Handel:

"Accompanied by Sister Dien van Zon, we joined Father André van Zon to visit the General Hospital of Maputo. André explained that he offers daily help to the children's department. Orphans, handicapped and/or under-nourished children are brought there for treatment/help. It happens very often that the children are left behind without anybody to pick them up or care for them. This is where André comes in the picture and the hospital people expect him to help instantaneously. He then takes care of standard things like food, diapers, etc. etc. Things that are being provided standardly in Dutch hospitals. We were very surprised to see André organising/arranging all these matters in such a short term. He must have gained a lot of experience here. He starts 'networking' in African style. Sometimes he asks neighbours or family members to foster these children. If this fails he makes his own arrangements.

In the hospital we met a female doctor at 82 years of age. She was a resolute and warm woman who told us in advance not to like people looking over her shoulder. So, privacy is also maintained here. With here tripod she visits all patients. She had heard that Thea has a medical background and she therefore asked us to join her on the visits. Spontaneously she explained us what was going on and why these children are in hospital. This upset us very much. The hospital expects family members to care for the patient 24 hours per day. They only can ask for hospital support if this is absolutely necessary. Due to this situation most people stay in their beds all day long. It was striking to see people smiling as soon as Father André was around. One little girl only talked when she saw Father André.

Sylvia was a very lively girl, and as soon as she saw a balloon or coloured pencils or a small picture she started to laugh. It was a very beautiful experience and we are glad that we were allowed to visit the hospital Where André works. What we saw was him offering beautiful and efficient support and we do admire him very much for that. Thanks André!!
